



Definite Term Lecturer (3 Years) in Digital Art / New Media

The Department of Fine Arts in the Faculty of Arts at the University of Waterloo invites applications for a 3-Year Definite Term Lecturer position in Digital Art / New Media beginning January 1, 2024.

The Department is looking for a candidate who possesses a fulsome understanding of emergent digital art and new media technologies, and the conceptual and practical application of these tools within a studio arts context. The ideal candidate will bring an expertise that indicates the advancement of digital art in one or more of the following areas: creative coding, generative art, artificial intelligence, applied gaming technologies, digital sculpture including digital fabrication technologies, AR (augmented reality), VR (virtual reality), robotics, net art, and/or blockchain technologies. The committee is open to considering emergent digital art practices which are not specifically listed. We encourage candidates to consider how their work may build collaborative research and teaching opportunities across campus and within the digital technologies sector.

Fine Arts currently offers a BA (Bachelor of Arts) in [Studio Practice](#) and [Visual Culture](#) and an MFA (Masters of Fine Art) in Fine Arts Studio. Many of our undergraduate students combine their degree with [Arts and Business](#) or [Honours Arts Co-op](#).

We seek to recruit individuals who can enhance the diversity of our department, enrich the learning experience of our students, and contribute to our creative community. The ideal candidate will be an artist with a passion for teaching and will have a record of accomplishment in their area of artistic practice or research-creation. The successful candidate will also demonstrate knowledge and ability to teach courses in both traditional and expanded approaches and will be prepared to contribute to our Foundation coursework. The ability to teach in one or more of the areas of drawing, painting, sculpture, and photography will be considered an asset.

Candidates must demonstrate evidence of success in teaching at the undergraduate level. Duties will include teaching 6 courses per year and contributing to the service needs of the Department.

The Department is looking for candidates with an MFA or PhD or equivalent in Fine Arts or a related discipline. If the candidate is at the 'all but dissertation' (ABD) stage or equivalent, the relevant degree must be awarded within six months of employment.

The salary range for this position at the rank of Lecturer is \$80,000-\$110,000.

The closing date for applications is October 1, 2023. Please include electronic copies of a cover letter (addressed to Dr. Monica Leoni, Chair,

Department of Fine Arts), a curriculum vitae, a one-page research statement, portfolio of recent artworks or other creative outputs documented through up to 20 images or audiovisual media, or a combination of both not to exceed 10 minutes, a one-page teaching statement, a one-page statement describing how you advance equity, diversity and inclusion within the classroom, and contact information for three individuals who will be called upon to provide letters of reference.
